- From September 17 - 18, 2020 the workshop Prominent Inferences, organized by Jet Hoek and Klaus von Heusinger, took place. As part of the series Referential Expressions in Discourse (RED) the workshop was held online as a zoom event for the first time. More than 50 participants exchanged views on the relation between prominence and inferences with the focus on how inferences affect the prominence of other elements in the discourse, for example discourse references. The workshop, which was designed for exchange, was also more than successful in the digital format: the onehour lecture sessions gave enough time for discussion and exchange. The breaks in

small breakout sessions rounded off this successful event.

Prediction is a central mechanism in the human language processing architecture, and there has been a lively debate about what form prediction may take. While predictions are a ubiquitous finding, their kind and strength seems to depend on (at least) three sources of variability in language processing:

- Intra- and inter-individual differences

- Stylistic variability

- Converging vs. diverging evidence from various methods (e.g., experimental, corpusbased). The aim of this Research Topic is to develop a better understanding of prediction in light of these three sources of variability. Contributions (e.g., original research, opinion pieces) from all areas of empirical psychoand neurolinguistics are welcome. Contributions must explicitly address variability and variation in language and language processing. Of course, contributions focusing on the relationship between linguistic prominence and predictions are more than welcome! More information on deadlines etc. can be found here.


