The publication of our previous edition in February happened to be on the first day of the war in Ukraine. Too many days of war have since gone by. Our world has changed. Millions of people have been forced to flee their country. People, governments and societies from around the world as well as the scientific community stand in solidarity with Ukraine. In addition to its general Prominence Fellowship Programme, the CRC has opened a call for two exceptional refugee fellowships for researchers from both Ukraine and Russia to give them the opportunity to work with us in Cologne for up to six months. Our call has also been published on Linguistics for Ukraine, a platform that shares offers from German-speaking academia to help linguists currently

affected by the war in Ukraine.

Germany has scored highest in the latest Academic Freedom Index (AFI) survey conducted by the University of Gothenburg and FAU Erlangen-Nürnberg. We are privileged to continue to be able to live and work in a safe environment whereas globally, the AFI has decreased substantially over the past decade.

Speaking of work, we would like to present and look back on the CRC's most recent activities. After an in-person semester start at the University of Cologne, we were delighted to meet with future scientists as part of this year's "KölnerKinderUni" (Cologne Children's University) in which the CRC took part. Preparations for the 3rd International Conference "Prominence in Language" in June are up and running. For this past winter semester, Clare was assigned as Substitute Professor in the German department at TU Dortmund. We are glad to have her back and are curious to learn more about her latest deployment.

For those of us who had missed the beginnings of your journey: what led to your time as Substitute Professor; how did this opportunity came along?

It was somewhat out of the blue! I was contacted by Prof. Sarah Schimke (Professor of German Linguistics at TU Dortmund), whom I have known for a long time. She was looking for a substitute to cover teaching in the department for the winter semester, because her department is in the process of recruiting a W3 Professor. She knew my career stage and thought that I might benefit from getting some more teaching experience. After discussing it with Petra (who was very supportive), I agreed in principle, after which I had to be approved by the faculty in Dortmund.

How did you prepare for this assignment? Did you follow certain precautions?

First of all, we had to re-organise our plans in project C07 luckily Umesh Patil was able to join the project for the winter semester. At the same time, I had four new seminar courses and a workshop to prepare for, so I wanted to write a lot of course materials in advance. In the end, I wasn't as far ahead with preparation as I planned, so the semester was very hectic at times!

What were your most ordinary, unexpected and challenging experiences during that time?

Ordinary: Two of the seminars were online only, so logging on to Zoom while sitting at my desk at home in Cologne was very familiar.

Unexpected: One of my courses was *Introduction to Linguistics*, and as I was preparing, I was very surprised that I remembered a lot of the examples from my first term as an undergraduate linguistics student (more than 20 years ago now!!).

Challenging: Trying to get to grips with the varying exam and credit requirements; introducing students to the IPA while everyone was wearing a mask.

What did you miss most?

Colleagues at the SFB, and having time to think about research.

And what will you miss most now?

Thinking about ways that linguistic research can inform practice in schools and classrooms.

Is there anything that you won't miss from your time as Substitute Professor?

Signing hundreds of PDF documents!

What were your take-home messages?

I learned a huge amount about teaching - too much to list here! It was a very beneficial experience, which I hope will be useful for my future career. I'm really grateful that it was possible.

Project C03 announces that they will grow again - They are welcoming Sonja Eisenbeiss back to the CRC, soon to be joined by another Postdoc colleague.




Vacancy in Z 🦻

On Friday, June 24, 10:00 - 12:30h, the second Postdoc career development workshop on *Cumulative habilitation and alternative (international) paths* will take place in the HoP. Find further details in the poster. The workshop primarily addresses CRC Postdocs, however, a few places will be made available to further Postdocs from the university. The hybrid and interdisciplinary symposium on Neurospeech will combine linguistic and neurological speech research. This Symposium (and the accompanying workshop, s. below) are supported by the CRC and a cooperation with the department of neurology of the University Hospital Cologne.

In the symposium, topics of speech motor control in scientific and clinical context will be discussed providing the following program. It is believed to be important for linguistic research to understand how language systems can be impaired when people exhibit speech motor and cognitive impairments. The keynote speaker will be Frank Guenther (Boston University, DIVA model of speech motor control). Even though the symposium is hybrid, the organizers are happy about every participant in presence. A workshop accompanying the symposium will take place on June 22 from 9:30 - 12:15h at IfL Phonetics Lab Cologne (Herbert-Lewin-Strasse 6, seminarroom). It is on *Speech Kinematic Assessment Approaches of Impaired Speakers: Speed, Amplitude, and Beyond.*

This workshop will provide an overview of various kinematic assessment approaches that are currently used to characterize speech motor performance in impaired speakers. The first part of the workshop will be used to address important fundamental topics, such as different approaches to head movement correction, dimension reduction, and kinematic measurement error calculation. Antje Mefferd (Hearing and Speech Science, Vanderbilt University, Nashville, USA) will illustrate how such kinematic analyses can be completed in a MATLAB-based program called SMASH (Speech Movement Analysis for Speech and Hearing research, Green et al., 2017). During the second part of the workshop, she will move into advanced topics of speech kinematic research. Here, she will discuss kinematic assessment approaches that go beyond basic segmental speech dynamics such as amplitude, speed, and duration. Antje Mefferd will explain these kinematic approaches based on examples of speakers with dysarthria and show how specific kinematic measures can be extracted in SMASH. At the end of the workshop there will be time for questions and discussion.
