

## KölnerKinderUni

Several projects of the CRC were once again involved in the KölnerKinderUni and offered engaging events on the topic of language for children grade 3-6. Find some impressions below:



The three pictures above show projects B02 and B05 in their KinderUni Event *Ab ins Feld!* - *Sprachen unserer Welt erforschen*. Maria Bardaji reports: "We used a kind of scavenger hunt to show the children how different the languages of the world can be. In teams, the children were given sentences in a language they didn't know. They then had to go through 5 different stations to find out how the language works, like real researchers in the field. With this information, they were able to resolve which language they had explored at the end: Datooga, Tima, Totoli or Yali." Petra Schumacher's team also offered a workshop at this year's KinderUni again. It was called *Geheimnisse unserer Sprache - Kann man Sprache im Labor untersuchen?* In a short warm-up with Clare and Magdalena, the children learned playfully what linguists actually do. Afterwards, they participated in an exciting lab rally through the XLinC Lab, where they got to know and try out the various methods used for studying language.
