Congratulations to **Semra Kizilkaya** (former PostDoc, **B04**) who received the [Wilhelm von Humboldt Award for young scholars](#). It was given to her and Aleksandra Ćwiek on February 28 at the 46th DGfS (Annual Meeting of the German Linguistic Society) in Bochum.



Congratulations to **Tabea Thies** (associated Postdoc, **A04**) who received the [Innovation Prize](#) of the Parkinson Foundation in the category clinical research. The prize is endowed with €100,000 and was awarded at the German Congress for Parkinson's and Movement Disorders in Rostock on April 26.

The project "Speech motor biomarkers in Parkinson's disease" aims to expand current knowledge

about speech motor deficits in individuals with Parkinson's disease in order to develop speech-based biomarkers for diagnostic and therapeutic speech interventions. 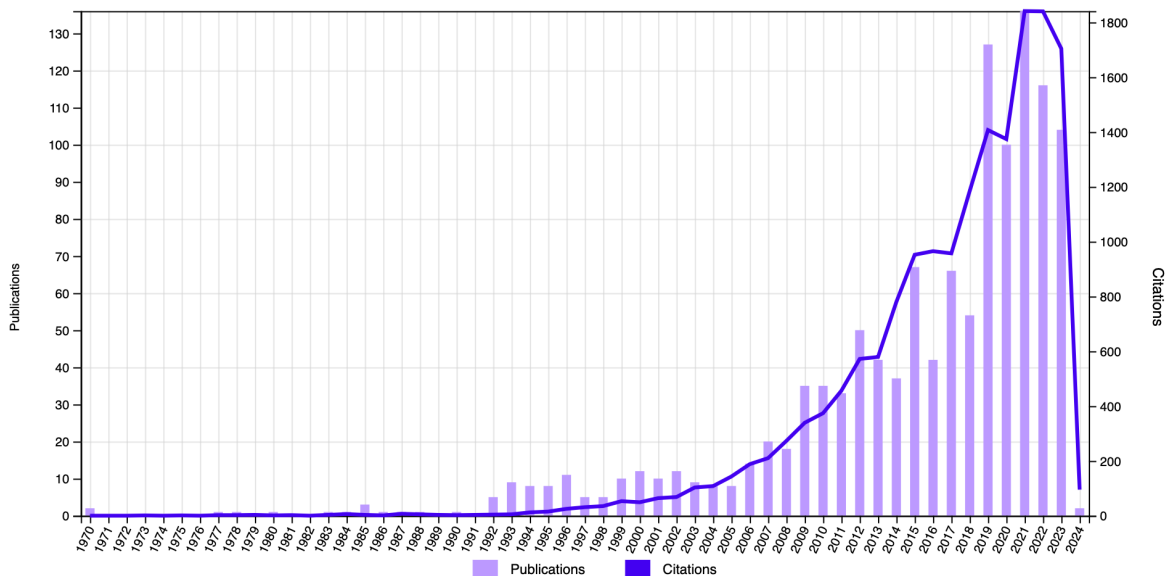
