- Welcome to Carolin Dudschig, who has replaced Andreas Trotzke as new professoral substitute at the beginning of October. Her areas of research include language and cognition. Carolin Dudschig, who will have her office in the Philosophikum (Room 2.120), will teach classes at the IDSL1, this semester for instance titled *Negation* and *Language electrified.*

1. What did you enjoy most during your time in the CRC?

The friendly atmosphere and solidarity amongst my colleagues and fellow PhD students. Thanks to them, moving to Cologne and settling down felt like an easy thing to do. In addition, I appreciated and learned a lot from our discussions and topics during the shared Area B meetings – those were a real highlight for me.



2. What will your new position be and what makes it interesting for you as a researcher? I am now a postdoctoral researcher at the German linguistics department of the University of Bielefeld, with the focus on language variation/sociolinguistics. This is a new specialization area for me and I am very excited about it! In my habilitation project, I plan to investigate socio-structural variation at the level of speech act realization, in particular with respect to apologies and requests.

3. Why do you think research on linguistics is important?

There was a time last year when I questioned my very own contribution to society through linguistic research. During that time, I talked to lots of nonlinguists and most of them were very excited about language. I listened to many stories about how "finding the right language" affected their lives. Our conversations reminded of the great diversity of our area of research with its various research traditions and intersections to other disciplines like sociology, anthropology or psychology. I decided to elaborate my research to the communicative functions of language and incorporate sociocultural theory.



ICPhS20

Many of our CRC members traveled to Prague to attend the **International Congress of Phonetic Sciences**, which took place August 7 - 11. Find some impressions and a report of the Sustainability Group below.


















Reports from the AG Sustainability about ICPhS20 🔹

In August, a big delegation of the CRC attended the International Congress of Phonetic Sciences (ICPhS) in Prague. We asked them anonymously how they travelled there, which sustainable practices they liked at the conference and what they thought could be improved. Here are the results!

Out of 18 attendees, 12 (i.e. two thirds) travelled to Prague by train as opposed to only 6 (i.e. one third) who travelled by plane. The latter number also includes people who went to Prague not from Cologne but from other places which were further away. The journey by train was around 10 hours or more, so we are very happy that many people still chose the train over the plane. This helped reduce the CO2 emissions of the CRC, following our selfcommitment on sustainable practices – thank you! Additionally, many attendees noted that they genuinely enjoyed the train ride. Some of them travelled with a bigger group of CRC phoneticians, and many were happy to see the beautiful view of the Elbe Sandstone Mountains.

At the conference venue, many attendees noted good sustainable practices. The welcome package included reusable water bottles to refill on-site as well as a public transport pass for the week. There were few printed paper booklets, instead, the full programme could be found in a mobile phone app. The welcome package also did not include merchandising or other items that might have been unnecessary. Additionally, the catering company selfproclaimed to have used locally sourced and seasonal ingredients and the food was served on regular reusable plates and cutlery (however, alongside single-use cutlery during the coffee breaks). What also stood out was the keynote lecture by Pavel Trofimovich, who dedicated his slot to talk about socially responsible research, including a section on environmental sustainability. On the other hand, the attendees also noted some practices that could have been improved to make the conference more sustainable. They would have preferred more vegetarian and vegan options for the lunch catering and the conference dinner. It was also suggested that vegetarian-only meals could have been considered. Additionally, the single-use cups and plates that were provided during the coffee breaks (alongside reusable ones) were deemed unnecessary. The use of paper could have been reduced even more by not providing any printed booklets (because the programme could be found in the mobile app) and by considering a digital presentation of posters (instead of printing them). Finally, it was noted that a hybrid option could have been more sustainable, because fewer people would have had to travel to Prague in person.

Thanks to all of the ICPhS attendees for sharing their thoughts! This gives us valuable insight for the organisation of future events here in Cologne.
