2 questions on Arndt Riester's research besides his work as a professoral substitute in the SFB:

What is your research goal?

The goal of my research in general has been to combine exciting aspects of formal pragmatic theories with naturally occurring corpus data and, thus, perhaps to give theoretical linguistic research a bit more street credibility.

What are you currently working on?

The framework I am currently working on is called QUD Trees (Riester et al. 2018). It is a method for the reconstruction of discourse structure which is not primarily based on discourse markers and discourse relations but on implicit questions (a.k.a. Questions under Discussion).






SFB-Networking February 14-15, 2019 in Potsdam
